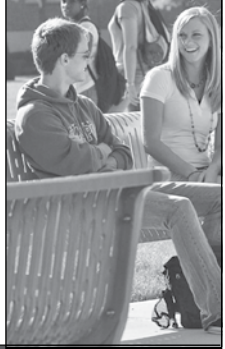

UIndy at a Glance

The University of Indianapolis is located in the heart of Indiana. Indianapolis sits at the crossroads of America. The four interstates leaving the city and the I-465 loop around it provide ready access to the campus, as well as easy connections with Indianapolis International Airport to the west.

A clean, safe downtown and Hoosier hospitality make the capital city a great place to spend your leisure time as well as a rich source of internships and career opportunities.

The University of Indianapolis is a private, residential, comprehensive university founded in 1902. Affiliated with the United Methodist Church, the University welcomes students of many nations and faiths from around the world. Each year, more than 5,000 full-time and part-time students, both graduate and undergraduate, benefit from our commitment to offering outstanding academic programs in more than 65 major fields of study.

UIndy owns a branch campus, the University of Indianapolis-Athens, a fully integrated international campus located near historic Syntagma Square at the base of the Acropolis. The University also has affiliations in Belize and China, including a partnership with Ningbo Institute of Technology in China that brings students to UIndy for their final two years of study.

The University of Indianapolis is committed to the spirit and letter of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Americans with Disabilities Act and strives to provide equal access in all phases of University life. The University of Indianapolis complies with FERPA

(the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, as amended). All student academic information is considered confidential; only directory information is available to the public. Additional information about the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act is available in the office of the Registrar.

Watchdog

Watchdog is UIndy's rapid emergency notification system. It is the chief wide-scale notification vehicle for the University in situations requiring rapid dissemination of information to all faculty, staff, and students and to select groups entered into the system; therefore, it will not be used for routine messages and announcements.

Watchdog does not replace other methods of communication, such as web, intranet, e-mail listservs, and news media. In most situations it will be the first method of communication, augmented by various other channels.

The UIndy e-mail address assigned to students will receive Watchdog alerts. Students are strongly encouraged to register a cell phone number in the system and, if possible, a home phone number as well to better ensure that they will receive an alert wherever they happen to be located.

Watchdog drills will be conducted once each semester.

Police Services & Campus Safety

University of Indianapolis Police Mission Statement

The mission of the University’s Police Department is to provide a safe and secure campus for all individuals at the University of Indianapolis. To achieve this mission, we will respect and safeguard the dignity and rights of all individuals.

We strive to maintain an environment in which the primary education mission of the University can be realized. The men and women of the Department are professionally trained to provide police, security, and parking services for the campus community. Our daily objective is to work in a partnership with the University community and to provide the highest quality of professional police services.

Campus Safety

The record for personal safety on the campus of the University of Indianapolis is excellent. Yet each person on campus must assume responsibility for personal safety, because no environment is risk-free. The University understands its role in this regard and is committed to developing safety programs and procedures that support an environment of well-being for the activities of its students, employees, and guests.

University Police

Personnel & Authority

The chief of the University of Indianapolis Police Department is a full-time employee and an Indiana Law Enforcement Academy-certified officer with law enforcement, investigation, and crime-prevention experience. The chief reports to the associate vice president of Student Affairs and dean of students. The Police Department employs full-time ILEA-certified police officers. UIndy police officers have full arrest powers and are qualified in the use of firearms and other law enforcement equipment.

The department utilizes sworn police officers from other area agencies in a part-time capacity on an as-needed basis. In addition to sworn officers, the University employs student cadets. These students are utilized for special events, ID checks, key control, and other safety-related services.

The University Police Department provides 24-hour safety and protection service for students, faculty, staff, and visitors. Its officers are charged with enforcing city-county ordinances, Indiana statutes, and University rules and regulations on campus. Officers are on

duty 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and 365 days a year.

Working Relationships with Local Police Agencies

The University Police Department maintains a close, cooperative relationship with the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department. The campus is located in the southeast district of the IMPD patrol district.

The University has its own FCC-licensed radio frequency for primary police communications and uses the Metropolitan Emergency Communications frequency for secondary police radio communication. UIndy staff occasionally work with other law enforcement agencies including the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department (IMPD), Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI), Joint Terrorism Task Force (JTTF), Beech Grove Police Department (BGPD), Marion County Sheriff's Department (MCSD), and other various agencies.

Meetings are held between the leaders of these agencies on both a formal and informal basis. The officers of UIndy and IMPD communicate regularly on the scene of incidents that occur in and around the campus area. The UIndy investigators work closely with the investigative staff at IMPD when incidents arise that require joint investigative efforts, resources, crime-related reports, and exchanges of information as deemed necessary.

There is a written memorandum of understanding between UIndy and MCSD; a written memorandum of understanding between UIndy and IMPD is being written as of this printing.

Training

The University of Indianapolis Police Department has a training coordinator who is responsible for overseeing and coordinating ongoing training for all campus police officers. Training subjects include criminal and civil law, public relations, race relations, interpersonal communication, crisis intervention, critical incident response, and all facets of protection of persons and property.

Training includes guest lecturers from the IMPD, BGPD, and the State Attorney General's office. This training usually includes updates on existing problems, new court decisions affecting the University environment, and other timely topics. In addition, all UIndy police are certified in standard first aid, CPR, and the use of AEDs.

Reporting Procedures

General Procedures for Reporting a Crime or Emergency

Students, faculty, staff, and guests are encouraged to report all crimes and public safety-related incidents to UIndy police in a timely manner. To report an emergency on campus call (9) 911. To report a non-emergency security or public safety-related matter, call UIndy at (317)788-3386 or send an e-mail to police@uindy.edu.

Emergency Call Boxes

UIndy officers may be contacted immediately by activating one of the six emergency call boxes on campus. The locations of the boxes are Christel DeHaan Fine Arts Center, Cory Bretz

Hall, Schwitzer Student Center, Nicoson Hall, Cravens Hall, and the University Apartments courtyard. All call boxes are located adjacent to above-mentioned buildings and marked by a blue light.

The emergency phone line is monitored 24 hours a day by the police department, and police officers are available to take reports. All UIndy incident reports involving students are forwarded to the dean of students. Investigators will investigate a report when it is deemed appropriate.

Emergency Notification of Crime-Related Incidents

In an effort to provide timely notice to the University of Indianapolis community, and in the event of a serious incident that may pose an ongoing threat to members of the UIndy community, a blast e-mail Crime Alert is sent to all students and employees on campus. The alerts are forwarded by the Chief of Police or a designee for approval and released to the community by University Communications.

Updates to the UIndy community about any particular case resulting in a Crime Alert may be distributed via blast e-mail; posted on the police website at police.uindy.edu; distributed via Watchdog; or shared with the the *Reflector* for a follow-up story.

Crime Alert posters also may be posted by University Police in campus buildings when deemed necessary. When Crime Alerts are posted in campus buildings, they are printed on orange paper and posted in the lobby/entrance area of the affected building(s) for seven days.

Daily Log

The University Police Department maintains a daily log of the date, time, location, case report number, and disposition of all crimes and fires filed with the department. This log is public record. Entries and updates are made in the log within two business days. The initial log is maintained for 60 days. Requests for data beyond 60 days will be provided to the requestor within two business days.

A daily crime log is available for review 24 hours a day at http://police.uindy.edu/clery/reported_crimes.php or at UIndy Police, located in the Schwitzer Student Center, room 001, M–F 8 a.m.–4 p.m., excluding holidays.

Incidents reported to UIndy Police that fall into one of the required reporting classifications will be disclosed as a statistic in this annual brochure.

Confidential Reporting Procedures

If you are the victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the University system or the criminal justice system, you may still want to consider making a confidential report. With your permission, a UIndy police officer can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity.

The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with wishes of confidentiality while taking steps to endure your future safety and that of others. The information provided will help UIndy Police to track potential crime patterns, keep accurate crime reporting statistics, and alert the campus community of any threat.

Reports filed will be counted in the annual crime statistics for the University.

Official reports are made to the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department unless the investigation has no significance outside the campus community. Reports are not forwarded when stolen property has no serial numbers or other identifying features or in matters involving campus citations for University parking or vehicle operation violations on campus.

Timely Notice

Notices of the occurrence of crimes in the 10 categories listed in this document are sent to the University of Indianapolis community through University e-mail. In addition, notice of crime trends for all reported crimes of a repetitive nature and of a continued threat to the community are published within one business day of the crime and/or identification of the crime trend.

Sexual Assault Policy

In general terms, the University defines sexual assault (see Sexual Offense Definition, below) as attempted or actual unwanted sexual activity, including forcible and non-forcible sex offenses.

While most of the overall process for handling social conduct disciplinary matters applies also to cases of alleged sexual assault, there are aspects of such cases that differ slightly from other personal misconduct situations. Further information is located in the Student Handbook on page 47.

SEX OFFENSE DEFINITION: *Any sexual act directed against another person forcibly and/or against that person's will*

or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity. Consent must be informed, freely given, and mutually understandable in words or actions that are unmistakable in their meaning.

REPORTING PROCEDURES: Any student who is the victim of a sex offense is encouraged to report the incident to a University official and to law enforcement authorities. Among the persons on campus who are prepared to provide information regarding assistance resources and options for action available to the victim are the Counseling Center staff, Student Health Center staff, the University chaplain, the vice president of Student Affairs & Enrollment Management, the dean of students, the Residence Life staff, and the chief of University Police.

Standards for confidentiality apply to discussions with the Counseling Center staff, the University nurse, and the chaplain. Reports to other campus administrators, including the dean of students, residence directors and resident assistants, are, by legislative act, considered official campus crime reports.

In addition to campus reporting procedures, a victim of a sexual assault is reminded of her/his right to report the matter directly to University Police, the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department, or the Marion County Sheriff's Department.

VICTIM ASSISTANCE & OPTIONS: The University offers assistance to victims of sexual assault in a variety of ways. Among the services available are counseling, advocacy, assistance in locating medical and legal help, and follow-up

Campus victims of sexual assault have the option of notifying proper law enforcement authorities on campus or off, and assistance in doing so will be provided on request. Changes in the academic and campus living arrangements of the victim may be made if requested and reasonably available. Assistance in obtaining change information and assistance will be provided on request.

ACCUSED PERSON'S ASSISTANCE AND RIGHTS: Any person accused of a sex offense has rights as well. Among those rights for any member of the campus community is the right to question the evidence presented by an alleged victim and to otherwise defend himself/herself through the University's established reasonable process procedures. Information and assistance in their interpretation will be provided by the vice president for Student Affairs.

Residence Halls

The residence hall system is under the administration of the Office of Residence Life and Housing. Each building is supervised by a live-in residence director who is supported by several student resident assistants.

All residents have the responsibility to maintain good safety procedures and

to avoid actions that may endanger themselves or others. To protect themselves and their property, residents should not prop open doors, use emergency doors for routine exits, or open exit doors to admit guests.

Residents bring personal property to the campus at their own risk. The University does not insure or guarantee the security of personal property. Students are encouraged to make sure their belongings are covered by insurance; please note that the University does not cover items that are lost, stolen, or damaged. For their own safety and the protection of property, residents are encouraged to keep room doors locked and to carry their room keys at all times.

University Police check exterior doors during rounds but do not patrol inside residence halls to check hallways or room doors. Students should keep their doors locked at all times. Outside doors of the residence halls will be kept locked at all times for security purposes.

Safety violations, unsafe conditions, and unidentified persons in any residence hall should be reported to residence hall staff or to University Police immediately.

Residence Hall Room Access

Each resident is issued a key that unlocks the residence hall room, interior hallway, and main entrance doors. All residence hall doors are locked 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Keys, Lock Cores & Personal Property

Residents are issued keys at no charge, but a fee is charged for replacement. Keys should not be lent to other persons or left unprotected. It is a violation of University policy for students to duplicate University-issued keys.

Cores to room locks may be changed on request and at the resident's expense. Cores to the main entrance door locks are changed during vacation periods; access is limited to University personnel. The original lock cores are returned at the conclusion of the vacation period.

Building & Facility Access

Classrooms and administration, library, and recreational facilities are open for use according to the approximate schedule listed herein. The schedule pertains to a normal work week during the regular academic year. Special events can alter the published schedule, and buildings are closed at approximately 4:30 p.m. when classes are not in session.

No exterior door keys other than for residence halls are issued to students. However, students may be permitted in any building after the above hours if they possess a Building Pass. Written requests for Building Passes, signed by the department chairperson, should be presented to the University Police Department.

Pass requests should be for a specific day and time. Students should contact University Police and present the pass with University ID. The officer will then accompany the student to the building and permit access for the student.

University Police may be contacted at (317) 788-3333. Building passes are issued Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-4 p.m.

Building Occupancy & Access Procedures

Employees and students are expected to carry their University IDs with them at all times and to produce such identification to University Police Officers on request. Employees and students who cannot produce the requested identification may be denied access to, or required

Alcohol & Drug Policy

Please refer to the policy on the possession, sale, and use of alcohol and/or illegal drugs on page 39 of the 2010–11 Student Handbook.

A Indiana state statutes pertaining to the possession, use, and sale of alcohol and illegal substances will be enforced.

Alcohol & Drug Awareness Programming

The University Police and Residence Life staffs perform alcohol and drug aware-

ness programs for students on an annual basis. University Police Officers conduct alcohol and awareness programs for all sections of the wellness classes conducted by the University.

Officers also conduct sessions of New Student Experience classes and speak to students about alcohol and drugs. Other Student Affairs departments conducting alcohol and drug awareness programs are the Student Success Center, Residence Life, and the Health and Counseling Center.

More information is available in the 2007–09 Biennial Review of Drug and Alcohol Prevention Programs at the University of Indianapolis, a report that is available in office of Campus Life.

Safety Education & Programming

During each school year, special programs and security procedures and concerns are discussed on a regular basis at in-service meetings of residence hall directors and student residence assistants. Safety and security reminders are published regularly in the student newspaper.

New students are made familiar with safety and security procedures via information provided each year during student orientation. Crime alerts are issued to notify the community of crime trends and precautions. Officers instruct students on drug and alcohol abuse in wellness and other classes several times during the school year.

Policies and procedures described herein are subject to change as deemed necessary by University authorities. Questions or information requests may be directed to the University Police office.

Safety Escorts

Safety escorts are available to and from campus locations. Call (317) 788-3333 to arrange for this service. Please allow a few minutes for a police officer to reach the location.

Emergency Procedures

Students and families are encouraged to communicate regarding emergency situations that may occur while the student is at the University of Indianapolis. The University has established an Emergency Management Team to guide response to campus crises that pose a threat to health, life, and property. Families should develop their own plan for communicating with one another when a crisis does occur.

The University has established multiple places that students and families can go for up-to-date information if an emergency situation does occur. There will be a Crisis Line set up for emergency purposes that can be reached at (317) 788-3559. Information will be posted on the University website at www.uindy.edu. The Emergency Management Plan is also posted on the website at <http://intranet.uindy.edu/emergency>.

The University's Emergency Management Plan includes information about Incident Teams; University operating status parameters; incident priorities and performance expectations; shelter-in-place and evacuation guidelines; and local contingency and continuity planning requirements.

University departments are responsible for developing contingency plans and continuity-of-operations plans for their staff and areas of responsibility.

The University conducts and tests the emergency notification systems on campus once each semester.

University Police Officers and supervisors have received training in Incident Command and Responding to Critical Incidents on Campus. When a serious incident occurs that causes an immediate threat to the campus, the first responders to the scene are usually UIPD, IMPD, and the IFD Fire and Emergency Medical Services Department, and they typically respond and work together to manage the incident.

Depending on the nature of the incident, other UIndy departments and other local or federal agencies could be involved in responding to the incident as well.

General information about the emergency response and evacuation procedures for UIndy are publicized each year as part of the institution's Clery Act compliance efforts, and that information is available on the UIndy website, www.police.uindy.edu.

Emergency Evacuation Procedures

Emergency evacuation procedures are performed and evaluated by the residence hall directors for each residence facility each semester. The evacuation procedures are directed and monitored by Residence Life and Student Affairs.

Notification of Missing Students

If a member of the University community has reason to believe that a student who resides in on-campus housing is missing, he or she should notify UIndy Police immediately at (317) 788-3333.

The department will generate a missing person report and initiate an investigation.

Should UIndy Police determine, after investigating the missing person report, that the student is in fact missing and has been missing for more than 24 hours, UIndy Police will notify IMPD and the student's emergency contact no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing. If the missing student is under the age of 18 and is not an emancipated individual, UIndy Police will notify the student's parent or legal guardian immediately after the police had determined that the student has been missing for more than 24 hours.

In addition to registering an emergency contact, students residing in on-campus housing have the option to identify, confidentially, an individual to be contacted by UIndy Police in the event the student is determined to be missing for more than 24 hours. If a student has identified such an individual, UIndy Police will notify that individual no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing.

A student who wishes to identify a confidential contact can do so through the Office of Student Affairs. A student's confidential contact information will be accessible only by authorized campus officials and law enforcement as appropriate.

Annual Crime Report

The University publishes and distributes this report or the notice of the existence and description of the contents of this report on a yearly basis to faculty, staff, students, prospective students, and employees. Statistics are gathered from crimes reported to the University Police Department and crimes reported

to the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department.

All crimes are categorized by using the Uniform Crime Report of the Federal Bureau of Investigation standard. Sex offenses are categorized per the standards of the FBI National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS).

Also, crimes reported to those persons in the campus community with primary counseling responsibility are reported to the author of this report by the submission of a number for statistical purposes only. The report by the counselor is voluntary and of a confidential nature. This document is published and distributed to accomplish compliance to the Clery Act and the 1998 Amendments to the Act.

As required by the Clery Act, Title II of 1990's Public Law 101-542 and 1998 amendments, the University chief of police compiles a tally of crimes reported on campus; totals are published in tables herein. The contents of this booklet, including crime statistics, are online at <http://police.uindy.edu/clery/>.

Crime Statistics

Procedures for preparing the annual disclosure of crime statistics include reporting statistics to the UIndy community obtained from the following sources: the University of Indianapolis Police Department, Athens (Greece) Campus, Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department, Danville Police Department, Carmel Police Department, Fishers Police Department, and non-police officials (as defined below). For statistical purposes, crime statistics reported to any of these sources are recorded in the calendar year the crime was reported.

A written request for statistical information is made on an annual basis to all campus security authorities (as defined by federal law) and to all University deans, directors, and department heads.

Statistical information is requested and provided to UIndy Police by employees in the University Counseling Center and Student Health Center, even though they are not required by law to provide statistics for the compliance document.

Hate Crimes Statistics on Campus

“All Reported Crimes” refers to those involving bodily injury that manifest evidence that the victim was intentionally selected because of the victim's actual or perceived race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, or disability.

“Reported Crimes” are crimes that must be reported in the annual report prepared by the campus police authority or the crimes reported to the campus police authority and/or the local police department as required by the Clery Act. These crimes include aggravated assault; arson; burglary; negligent manslaughter; murder and non-negligent manslaughter; robbery; sex offenses, forcible and non-forcible; and vehicle theft.

The table lists the crimes reported that manifest evidence that the victim was selected intentionally because of the victim's actual or perceived race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, or disability.

The University of Indianapolis has had no reports of crimes motivated by bias resulting in bodily injury. There were no bias-motivated crimes in the nine categories listed in this booklet reported for 2009, 2008, or 2007.

Athens Campus

The University of Indianapolis Athens Campus has no reports of crimes on campus for the 2009 calendar year.

Annual Fire Safety Report

If a fire occurs in a UIndy building, community members should call 911 immediately, then UIndy at (317) 788-3333.

The fire alarms alert community members of potential hazards, and community members are required to heed their warning and evacuate buildings immediately upon hearing a fire alarm in a facility.

Use the nearest stairwell and/or exit to leave the building immediately. Community members should familiarize themselves with the exits in each building. The fire marshal can levy fines and penalties to individuals who fail to evacuate a building promptly—but the more important reason for evacuating is for safety reasons!

When a fire alarm is activated, the elevators in most buildings will stop automatically. Occupants should use the stairs to evacuate the building. If

you are caught in the elevator, push the emergency phone button. The emergency phones in elevators on campus typically ring to the UIndy Police office.

University Police publishes this fire safety report as part of its annual Clery Act Compliance document via this brochure, which contains information with respect to the fire safety practices and standards for UIndy. This report includes statistics concerning the number of fires, the cause of each fire, the number of injuries and deaths related to a fire, and the value of the property damaged by a fire. The compliance document is available for review 24 hours a day on the UIndy website at <http://www.uindy.police.edu>.

A majority of University buildings are equipped with automatic fire detection and alarm systems that are constantly monitored by Central Security & Communications.
