









This championship is particularly significant because football returned to Central only last year after an absence of many years.




Against Manchester, Bill Clark (50) picks up yardage through tackle.





Woody McBride and Dwight Swails, who led their team in scoring, were third and fifth respectively in the state-wide contest.




McBride (90) sinks one against North Central, as Harley Griffith (96) looks on.




