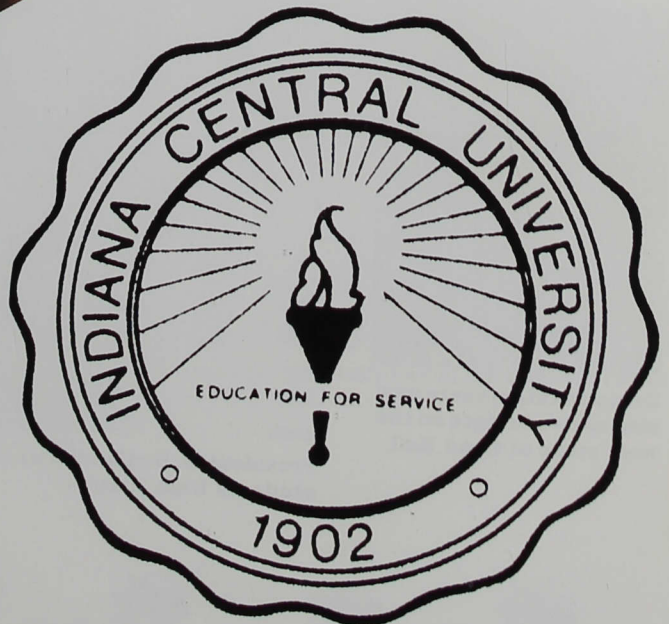




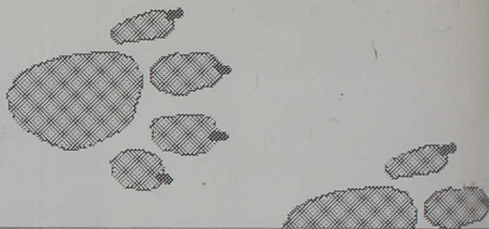

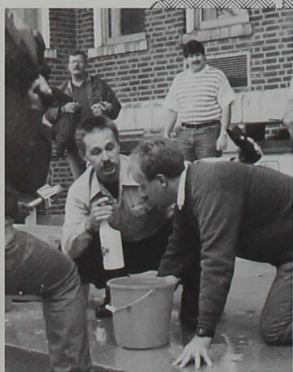

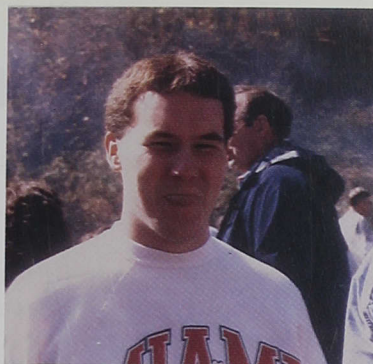

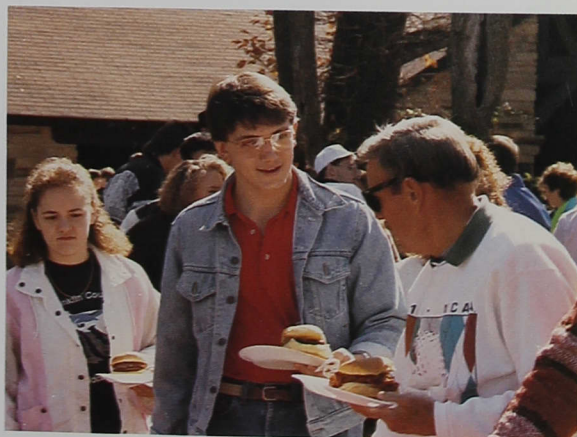

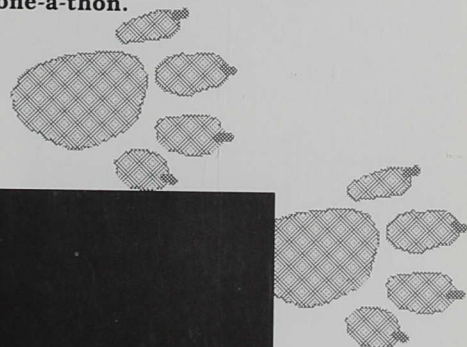

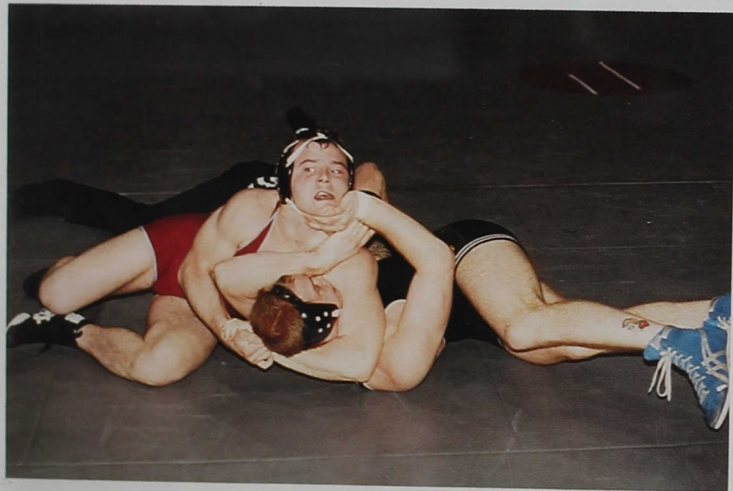
Greyhound Sports

Major gift launches Fine Arts Center

Christel DeHaan gives \$3.5 million



Christel DeHaan

DeHaan, president/CEO of Resort Condominiums International, Inc., was introduced at the dinner and spoke about the "joy and responsibility" of charitable giving. A former U of I student and a trustee for over a year, she emphasized that charitable giving brings "far more to the giver" than to the recipient.

She received a standing ovation from the audience of fellow trustees, alumni, students, faculty and staff.

The new building will feature a performance hall that will seat 450-500 people, and will be the "newest, most up-to-date, performance facility in the city and of a size not currently available in Indianapolis," said Lantz. Additionally, the center will house classrooms, offices and studios for the music and art departments and enable the university to enhance its cultural offerings in music, art and poetry.

Music department chair Dr. Jo Ann Domb noted that the proposed performance hall will be the "only medium-sized hall in the city acoustically appropriate for chamber music." Dr. Ron Rarick, art de-

An \$8 million fine arts building will be funded in part by U of I trustee Christel DeHaan and will be the first thrust of an aggressive renovation plan to enhance the physical appearance of the campus.

President G. Benjamin Lantz, Jr., announced news of the \$3.5 million naming gift to alumni, students, faculty and staff at the annual Honors and Recognition Ban-

quet. DeHaan, president/CEO of Resort Condominiums International, Inc., was introduced at the dinner and spoke about the "joy and responsibility" of charitable giving. A former U of I student and a trustee for over a year, she emphasized that charitable giving brings "far more to the giver" than to the recipient.

partment chair, expressed his pleasure at the prospect of having the "space and lighting to do some of the things we've wanted to do." The building will be from 40,000 to 50,000 square feet in size.

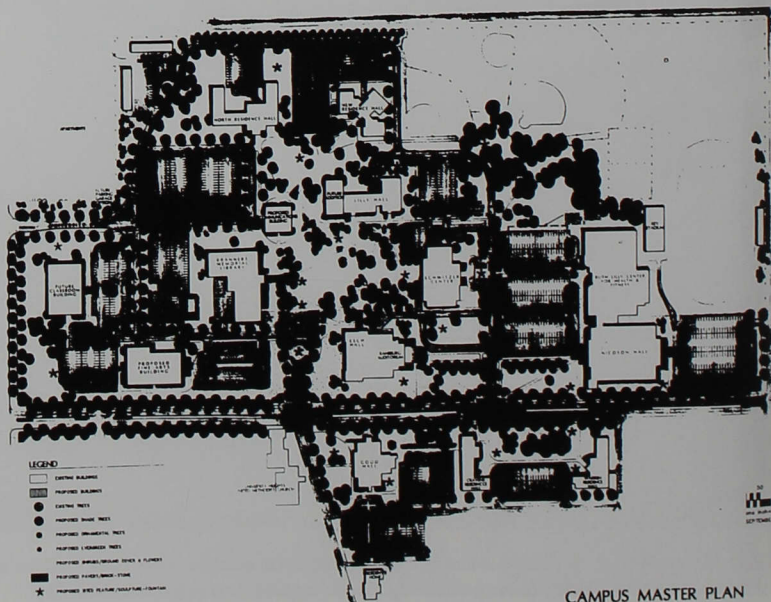
"We are elated and extremely grateful to Christel DeHaan for her generosity to the university," said Lantz. "Through her exemplary corporate leadership, her strong interest in international affairs, education and the arts and this gift, she is making extraordinary contributions not only to U of I students but also to all citizens of Indianapolis and surrounding communities."

Individuals and corporations will complement the naming gift to provide total funding for the project, said Lantz. This gift is one of the largest ever received by the university for a single project.

The announcement of the new Christel DeHaan Fine Arts Center signals the first step in the campus-wide development project.

The ceremonial ground breaking was May 12, in conjunction with the Donor Recognition Dinner symbolizing the actual ground breaking that would take place during the summer of '92.

ISG sponsored a fifties dance the Friday before the basketball homecoming.

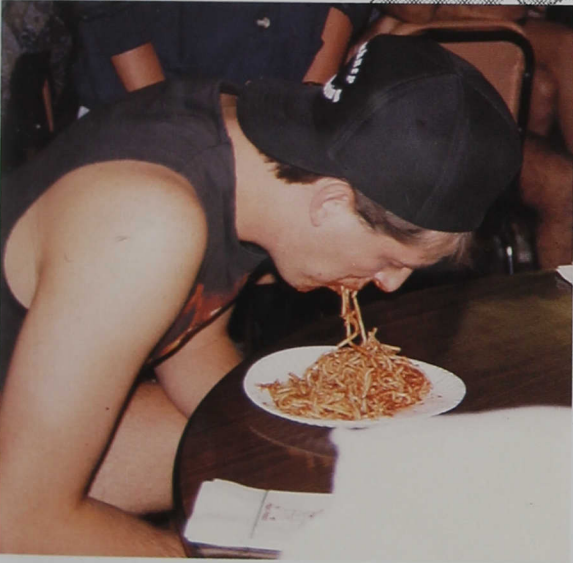
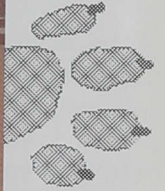

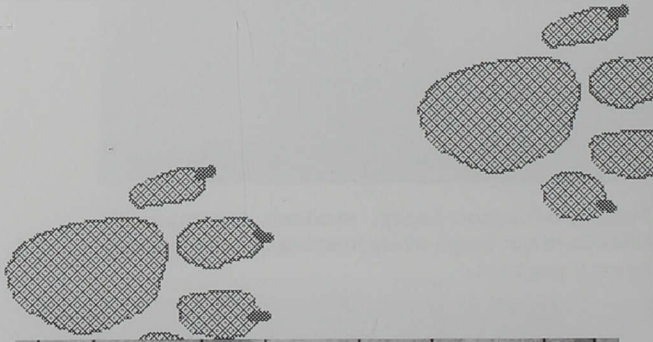
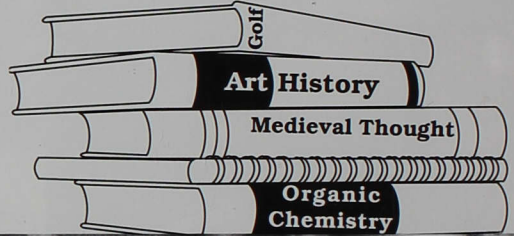


Time to hit... the books !

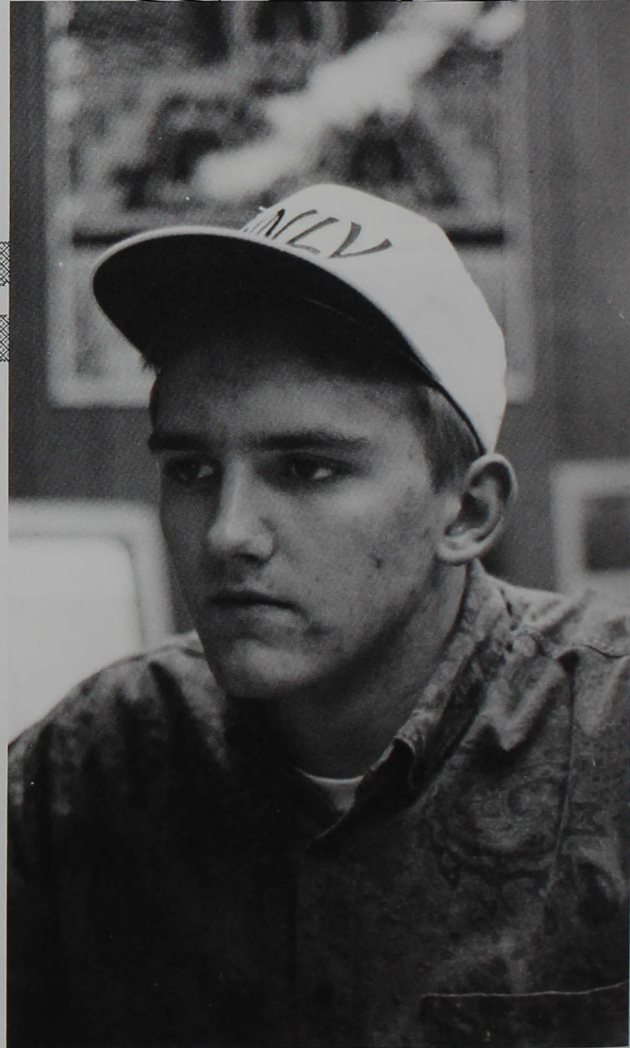

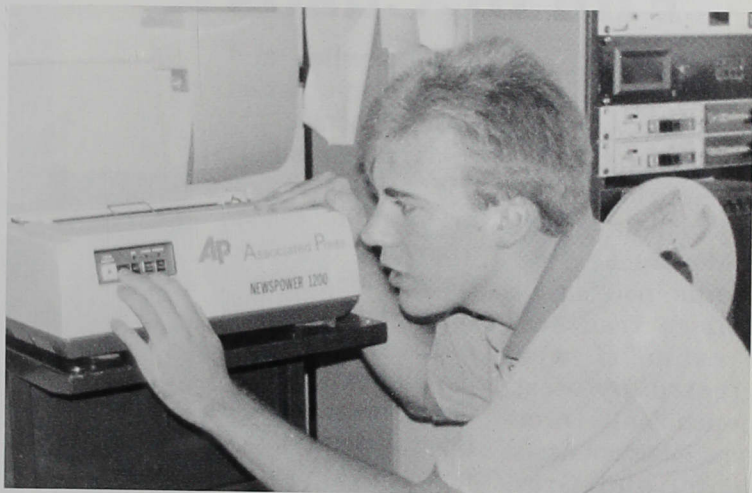

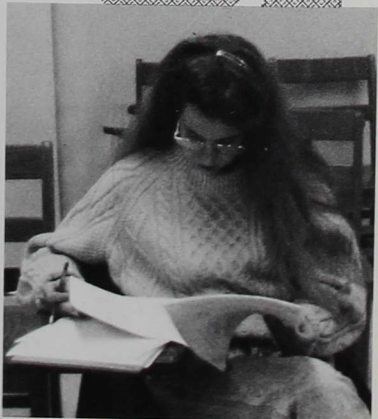

Exploring new frontiers was the theme for freshmen orientation and vari-

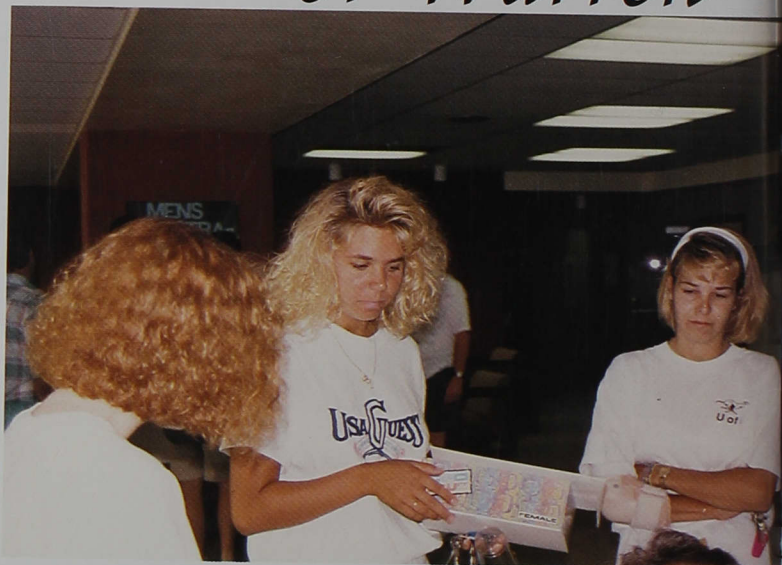
ous activities and decorations carried out the theme.

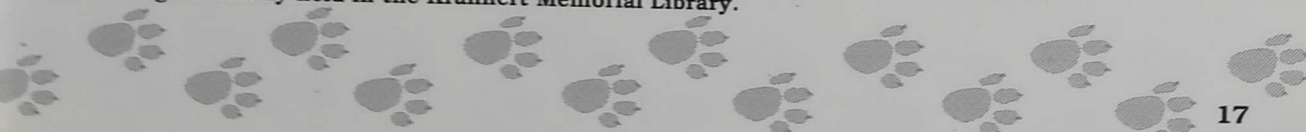

Troy Gambrel killed in car accident

Freshman Troy Gambrel died instantly Saturday, March 14, in a car accident in Ohio which also injured sophomore Jeffrey Stein and two IU students.

"We are deeply saddened by the tragic death of one of our promising young students, and we share our sympathy with the families of Troy and Jeff and the IU students involved," said President G. Benjamin Lantz, Jr.

Gambrel, a North Hall resident and a marketing major, had excelled in speech team competition, his novice year.

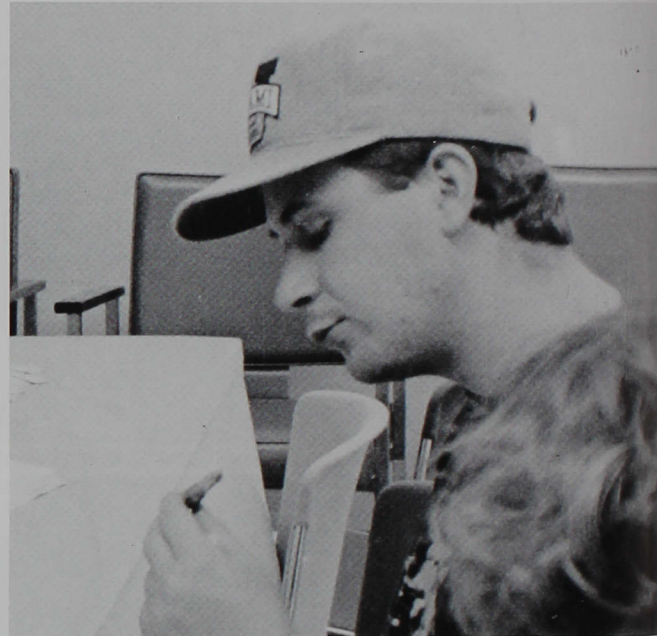
He was named posthumously the outstanding freshman forensic student and the freshman award was renamed in his honor, according to Professor Audrey

Cunningham, speech team coach. The funeral was Wednesday, March 18, at the Plymouth Wesleyan Church in Plymouth.

Gambrel planned to compete in the national speech team competition in Minnesota Easter weekend. He had won numerous awards both semesters.

These two U of I students and two Indiana University students were on their way to Ohio State University for a speech meet, when the driver lost control of the car on the snowy road.

The car, traveling on I-70 east, ran off the right side of the road striking a tree and wire fence. Gambrel was killed instantly. Stein was taken to Miami



Valley Memorial Hospital in Dayton by ambulance. Stein underwent leg and hip surgery. The driver, Dennis Barton III, was

flown by helicopter to the hospital. Jason Fruits was taken to the hospital and released.

Bookstore undergoes major remodeling

Along with a new school year came many new changes to the campus. One of these changes was the new management and the major remodeling of the bookstore.

In April, Follett College Bookstores took over the management of the U of I bookstore. According to Ken Hottell, business manager, many universities in Indiana are turning over the management of their bookstores to Follett. Butler University's bookstore management switched the year before we did, and Anderson College switched in late June of 1991, according to Hottell.

Changing management has been very beneficial for the bookstore. Follett uses

a computerized system to find available books which are housed in its warehouse in Chicago. More used books are available in this manner, which cuts the cost for books at the beginning of the semester.

"The savings to the students is astronomical," said Hottell. "We never had a computer link to help us locate used books. We only had what used books students turned in at the end of each semester."

Follett is capable of running the bookstore in an economical manner because the company already has trained professionals in marketing to do the jobs of managing and running bookstores.

The remodeling involves

a modern concept of letting students choose their books from the shelves instead of standing in line and having an employee get the books for them.

"The bookstore was just too crowded in the past and it was difficult to have a pleasurable shopping experience," said Hottell. "Students can get through the aisles easily now to find what they want."

The buy-back procedure for books at the end of the semester follows a distinctive plan. If the books will be used again the following semester, then the student will receive half of the original price of the book until the bookstore reaches the level of stock which it needs for that particular book. If

the books will no longer be used in classes, then the student will receive money for the book according to the national list of values.

Even with the major changes, other improvements are still planned for the bookstore. Management hopes to have more best-sellers, both fictional and nonfictional, in stock for students' enjoyment, according to Karl Snider, manager of the bookstore.

Plans also include creating more shelf space on the wall next to the greeting cards in order to make room for more text books.

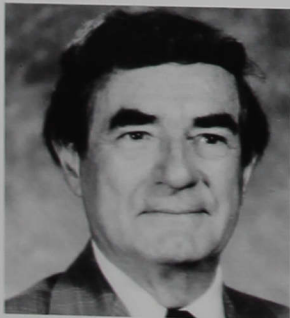
Underwood leaves impact on U of I

H. Merrill Underwood was an earth-space science faculty member at U of I for 26 years. He earned his A.B. degree in history and science from U of I in 1940.

He became an adjunct member of the faculty in 1956 and retired in 1982. He taught science to junior high school students for 33 years also.

In addition to teaching, Underwood was an active

member of Kiwanis International and University Heights United Methodist Church. One of his greatest contributions to U of I was his collection of rocks, minerals, and fossils which he donated on April 3, 1991.



The collection has an estimated value of over \$30,000. Underwood acquired these specimens

during his travels throughout the world.

His collection created the Underwood Geological Museum, located in Lilly Hall. He served as the curator until his death.

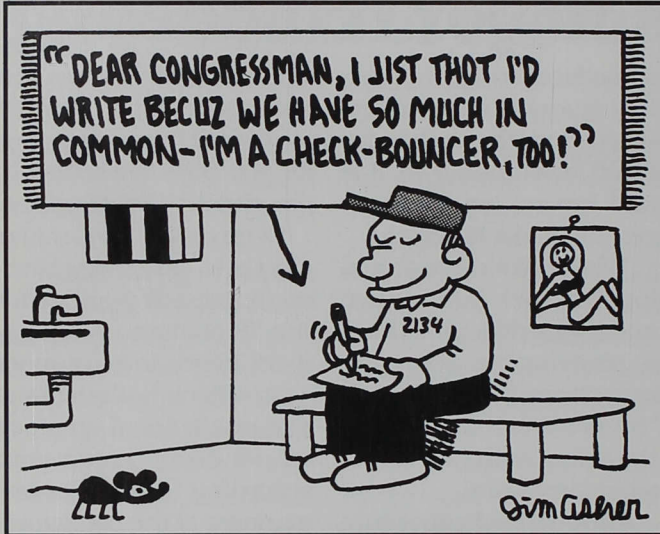
On Dec. 12, 1991, Underwood passed away leaving fifty percent of his estate to U of I, to be used in maintaining his museum, and to assure that it will remain as impressive as it is today.

Tyson loses round with courts

Mike Tyson was charged of raping an 18-year-old Miss Black America contestant at his hotel suite, July 19, 1991.

Tyson was found guilty by the Indianapolis courts. He was sentenced to three concurrent 10 year terms; however, he had 4 years suspended off each term. Tyson is being held in Plainfield, Ind., at a minimum security prison.

"It's a shame he's not a better role model for kids," said Anthony Wood, fellow boxer.

"His being in the position he was in, he should

have carried himself better," said Kenneth Kidd, fellow boxer.

Only a decade later, while guys with big dreams worked out at the gyms, Tyson was sweating in the City-County Building two and a half miles away.

Dahmer pleaded guilty

Jeffrey Dahmer pleaded guilty but insane to 15 slayings in January of 1992.

Six months before his trial, he had admitted to killing and dismembering 17 young males, having sex with the corpses, and saving one victim's heart to eat.

His court trial was in his home state of Minnesota.

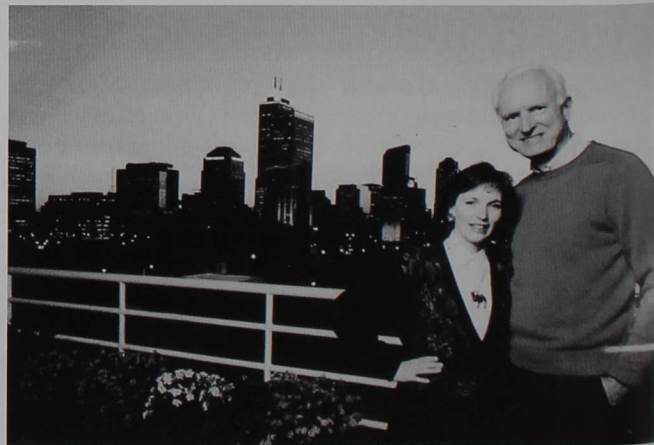

The 1991 U of I football team finished the season with a disappointing 2-8 record, losing its last seven games of the year. This marked the first time a Greyhound football team had lost seven consecutive games and the worst record since 1969 under head coach Bill Bless. The two victories came against Wayne State and St. Joseph's.

The Greyhounds finished a disappointing 10th in the Midwest Intercollegiate Football Conference (MIFC).

Senior quarterback Mark Shepler finished his career ranked 10th on the all-time list of passing touchdowns (10), completions (101), and passing yardage (1,534).

Shepler's main target was junior wide receiver Josh Werling who caught 23 passes for 299 yards and two touchdowns. Senior tight end Larry Wiley had his best year as a Greyhound with 20 receptions for 236 yards.

Werling and sophomore Mike Gillock finished the season ranked 1 and 2 in the MIFC in punt returns. Gillock averaged 11.4 yards per return and Werling was runner-up with 8.5 yards.

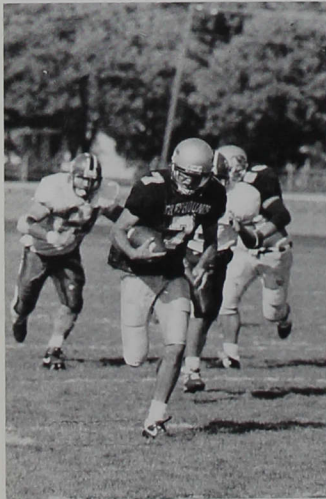
Senior defensive lineman Greg Matheis finished out his stellar career with eight quarterback sacks to finish sixth in the conference.

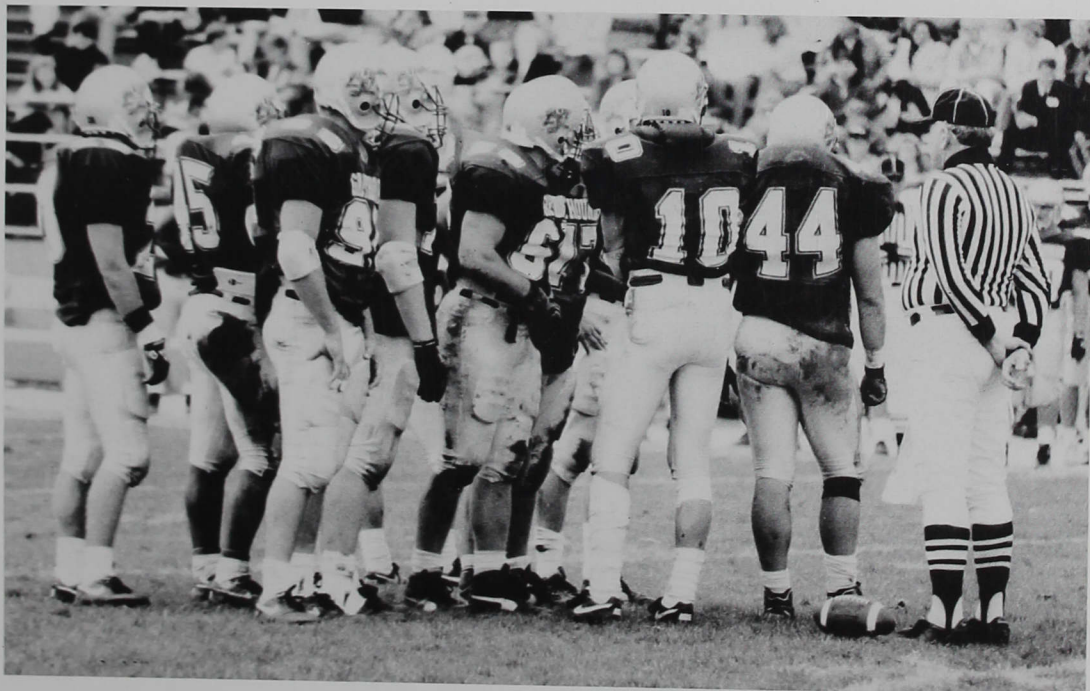

The 1991 University of Indianapolis' men's and women's cross country teams might have enjoyed the winningest season ever coached by Tom Hathaway. The men led by senior Mike Oppy and junior Chris Johnson recorded a record. Junior Michelle Faulkner led the women to an outstanding 67-3 record. The women successfully defended their Little State Championship at Indiana University with a third place with Faulkner being named All-Little State. The women took home five titles with the other three finishing second. One of the seconds was the Great Lakes Valley Conference Meet. 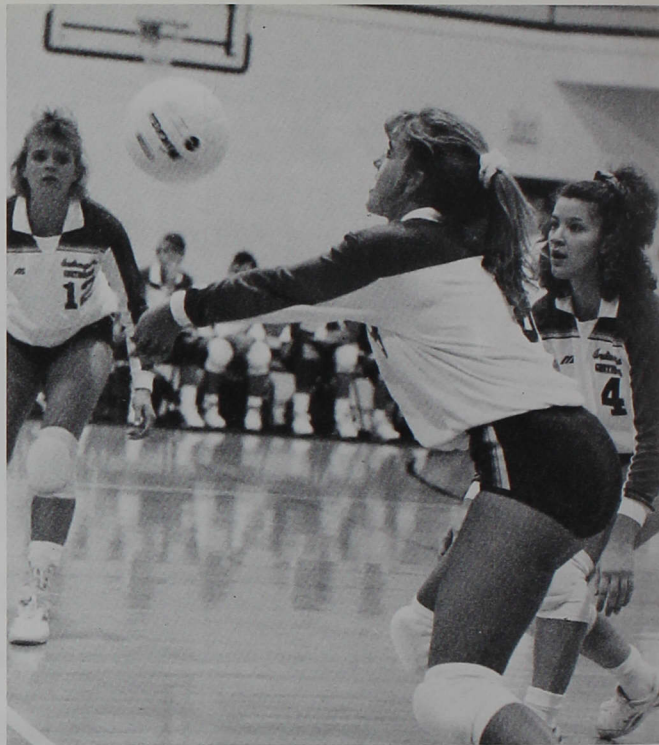

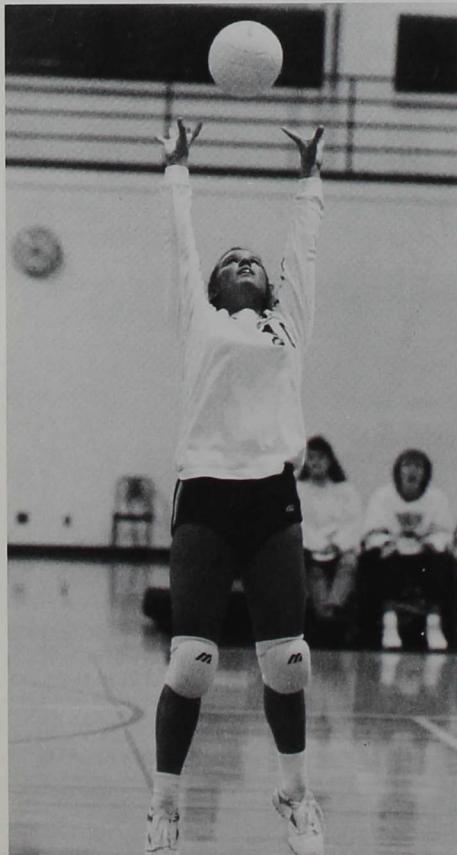

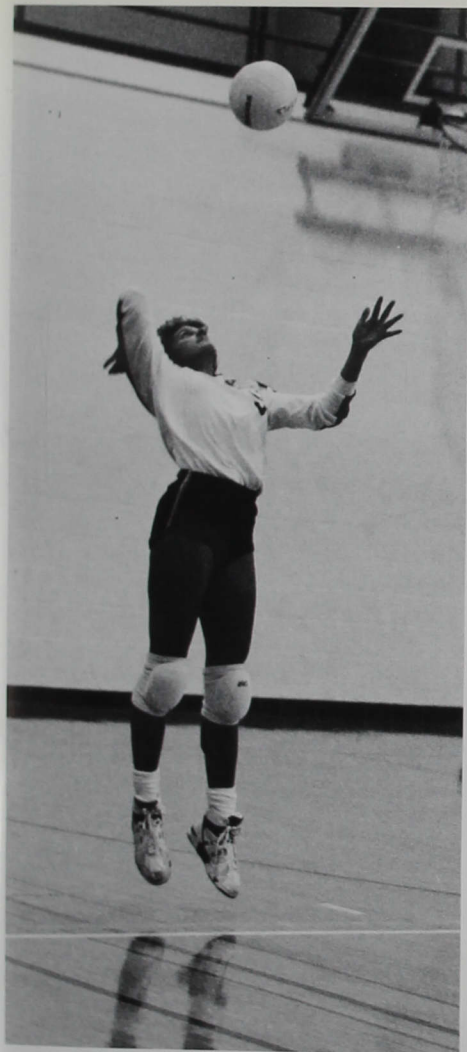


Sophomore Jill Hetherington works to set the ball.

Hole in One!

Coach Ken Partridge's men's golf team continued the dominance in the GLVC by winning its fifth straight GLVC championship last fall. The greyhounds outdistanced runner-up Lewis by eight strokes to win the 54-hole tournament played on the Purdue South Course.

Senior Captain Kyle Brunner and junior Sam Thompson each chipped in 34's on the final nine holes to clinch the championship. Brunner finished second in the medalist race by two strokes with rounds of 72, 77, and 73 on the par-71 course.

Thompson finished four shots behind Brunner with a 226 total. Freshmen sensations Chris Boeke and Barry Dennett played well in their first GLVC tournament and junior Scott Richardson rounded out the total team effort. Coach Partridge was named the GLVC "Coach of the Year" for the fifth straight time and the sixth overall during his successful run as the greyhound coach. Coach Partridge guided his 1991 championship team to an outstanding 87-9 record with five tournament championships.

The greyhounds were 30-1 against NCAA II opposition and 22-7 against NCAA I teams.

"Each conference championship is sweeter because we are establishing a new record and other teams are shooting at us," said Coach Partridge. "It was a great credit to all five of our players that we were able to shoot our season average (75.2) despite the cold, wind, and the pressure. It was also rewarding that three of our players (Thompson, Boeke, and Dennett) played so well in their first GLVC championship competition."

The men's golf team also continued to make history by being ranked third in the Golfweek Golf Coaches Association of America NCAA II ranking during the week of November 2, 1991. The third place ranking is the highest ever for any Indianapolis team since the university became affiliated with NCAA Division II. National powers Columbus College (Georgia) and Florida Southern are ranked ahead of the linksters.

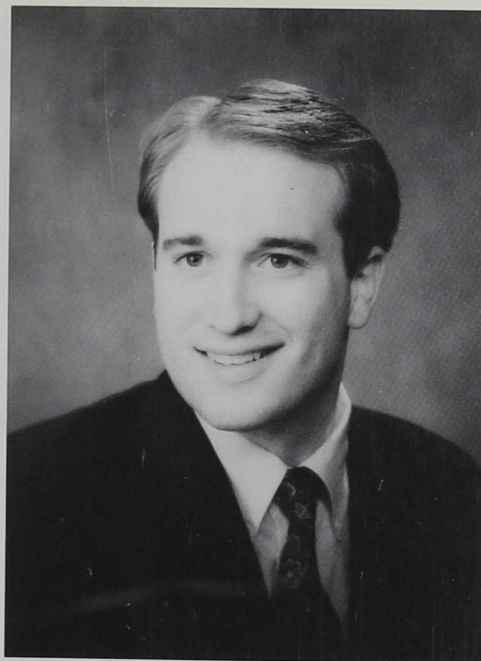

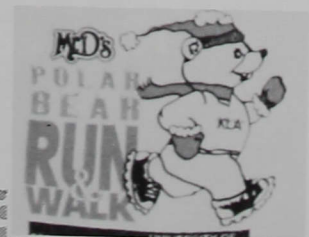

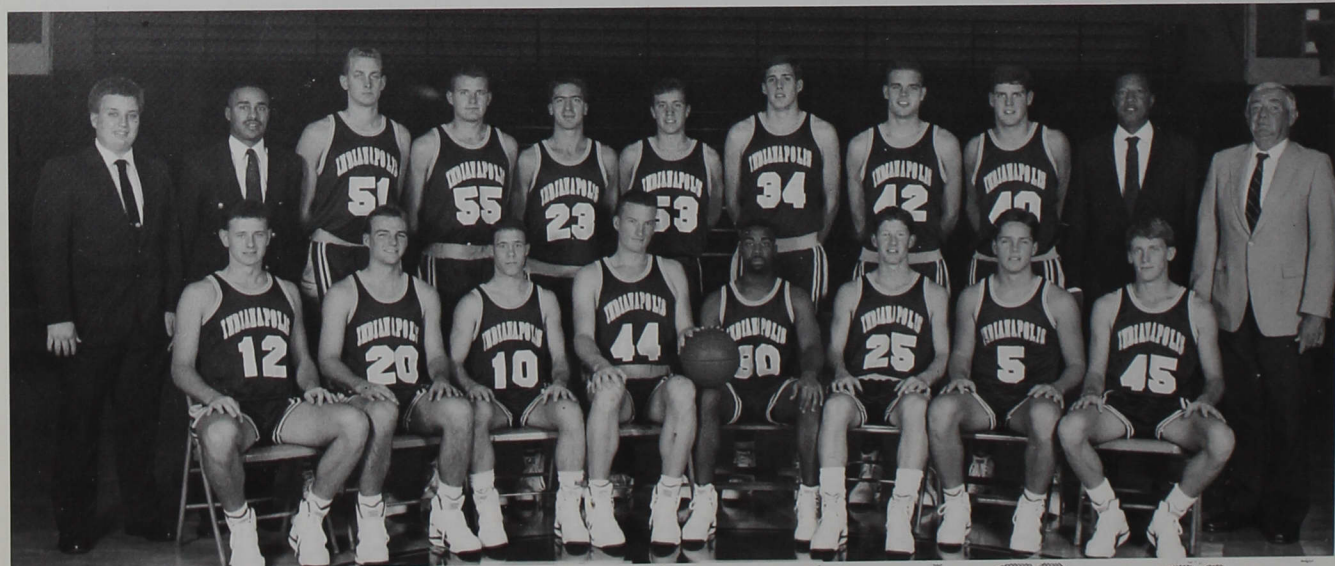

The Lady Greyhounds finished the season with an 18-10 record. The victories included two over NCAA Division II Nationals participants Northern Kentucky and NAIA Division I powerhouse Mount Mercy.

Among the losses were some close ones. Two encounters with GLVC Champions Saint Joseph's left them losing by two points and four points. The clash with Bellarmine was another two-point loss. U of I finished sixth in the 10-team conference with a 10-8 slate, its best league record in four years.

Not disappointed with his team's efforts, Coach Chuck Mallender said, "The team worked very hard, especially when we were out of the conference race as we were so focused and intense and the NKU game, the last one of the season, proves it; however, I believe we fell a little bit short of our potential."

Four Lady Greyhounds ended the season with double-figure averages in scoring. Indianapolis was led by GLVC second-team pick Lori Morgan and honorable mention selectee Courtney Sands.

Junior Morgan led the team in scoring with a 14.1 and tallied a season-high 25 point in the last game. Scoring in the double figures in 23 of the 28 games, she earned 20 or more points in three games and led the team in rebounding with an average of 7.3 caroms a contest.

Junior Sands finished second in team statistics in both scoring (12.1) and rebounding (7). Sands scored in the double figures 18 times, including four 20-point plus performances.

Sophomore Sam Fenneman scored 20 points or more in three of the first five games, ending with a team high six 20-point performances including a high of 24. She finished the year with an average of 11.7 points and 6.8 boards a game.

Junior Sandy Herre and freshman Melissa Graham shot 43 percent behind the three-point arc for 72 points. This shooting put Graham in the nation's top ten leaders.

Graham scored in the double figures in 20 games with a high of 20 and an average of 11.4 points per game.

Senior Kathy Miller finished fifth on the team in scoring with 9.4 and a high of 19, hitting double figures in 11 games.

Senior Leah Ann Adams was praised by Mallender as a defense specialist who led the team in free throw percentage with an average of .722.

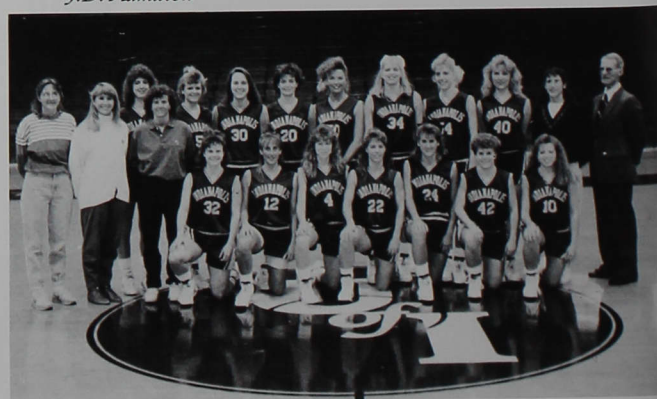


Junior Sandy Herre displays her excellent free throw shooting ability.

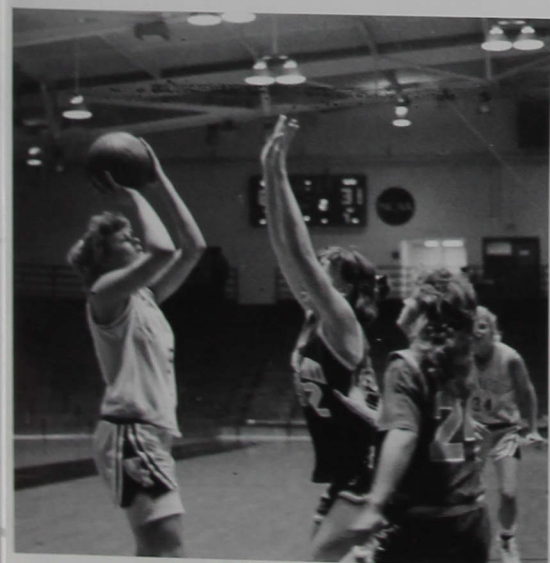

Many coaches and many teams set high academic and high athletic goals, but few are fortunate enough to achieve elite status. Coach Seemann Baugh and his 1991-92 swimming and diving team made it.

For the first time ever, the U of I lady swimmers and divers were selected to the NCAA All-American Team for both semesters. The women's team's GPA during the first semester placed them as the nation's fifth-smartest squad. The ladies earned their third induction for the second semester.

Senior Jennifer Grove led the way, earning a 4.0 GPA both semesters. Grove graduated *magna cum laude*, while captain Linda Jongkind and past letter winner Christine Kane were honored as *cum laude* members.

On the men's team, senior Brent Sneed was an academic stand out, graduating in three years with *magna cum laude* honors.

Sophomore Kristi Hamilton led the many sterling athletic accomplishments, qualifying for the NCAA-II National Meet in seven events, swimming in four and becoming an All-American in three.

Hamilton became the school's first three-time All-American swimmer, breaking U of I records in all three events at the National Meet. The two-time Greyhound MVP set new marks in the 200 breaststroke (2:28.77), 100 butterfly (59.30) and 200 butterfly (2:11.28).

"She has been a real dream to coach," said Baugh. "She is very intense and has that desire to do extra. She swam a great Nationals meet and capped a phenomenal season."

Hamilton also holds the school plateau for the 200 individual medley (2:11.52).

Sophomore Kathy Hulen established new milestones in the 100 (1:03.11) and 200 (2:19.69) backstrokes.

The 200 medley relay team (Hulen, senior Bridget Bailie, freshman Nicole Rives and Grove) set a new record at 1:56.79 as did the 400 medley relay team (Hulen, Bailey, Hamilton and Jongkind) at 4:11.35 and the 800 freestyle relay squad (Jongkind, Grove, Hamilton and Rives) in 8:02.57.

The ladies topped a 14-team field to win

the U of I Invitational, finished second at the Little State Meet, fourth at the Mideast Classic Championships and 21st at the NCAA-II National Meet.

Sophomore Jenny Double received the Kelso Reid Mental Attitude Award at the university's Winter Athletic Banquet.

"The women achieved all of their academic goals and all of their athletic goals except for winning the championships (Mideast Classic)," said Baugh, "but still had an outstanding season."

Freshman Sean Dwyer led the men, as he contributed to five new school records while being voted the squad's MVP.

Dwyer established new plateaus in the 200 fly (1:58.63), 200 IM (1:58.53) and 400 IM (4:10.07).

The combination of Dwyer, Kelso Reid Mental Attitude Award recipient Sneed, junior Andre Vera and junior captain John Dils swam the 800 free relay in a school-best 7:04.33.

Dwyer, freshman Doug DeJong, sophomore Kirk Wright and Dils established the new mark in the 400 medley relay at 3:33.96.

The team of DeJong, Vera, Wright and Dils swam the 200 free relay in a univer-

sity-record 1:26.66, while freshman Keith Frederick, DeJong, Wright and Vera swam the 200 medley relay in a school record-breaking time of 1:40.26.

Vera, a Grand Rapids Junior College transfer, established the new record in the 200 free (1:45.25) while Wright set the mark in the 100 fly (53.39).

"This year's team was the most powerful men's team balance-wise," said Baugh. "It was also the most versatile."

The men won their seventh consecutive Mideast Classic Championship in the seventh year of its existence. The men finished third in the U of I Invitational, second in the Evansville Invitational and second in the Little State Meet.

Both teams finished fourth out of the 86 colleges entered in the College Swim Coaches' Forum Meet in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, over Christmas break. Over 3,200 athletes competed at that event.

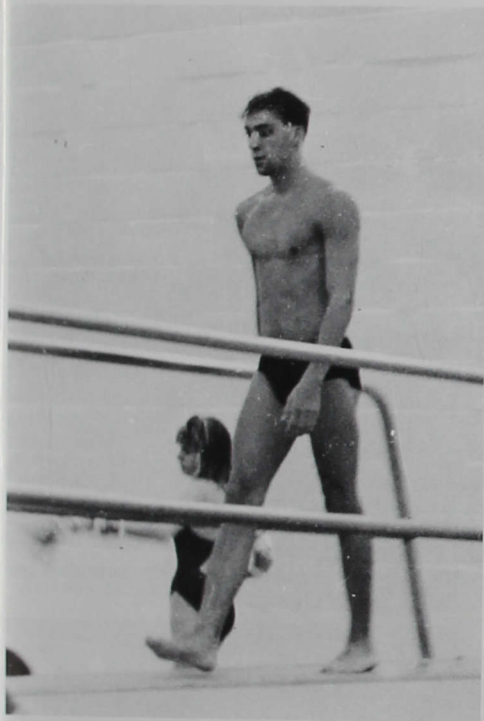
The swimmers also hosted 19 past letter winners for the fourth annual Alumni Meet, including former Greyhounds from Sweden, Washington, Texas and Florida.

The ladies notched a 32-10 overall season record, while the men swam to 39-9.

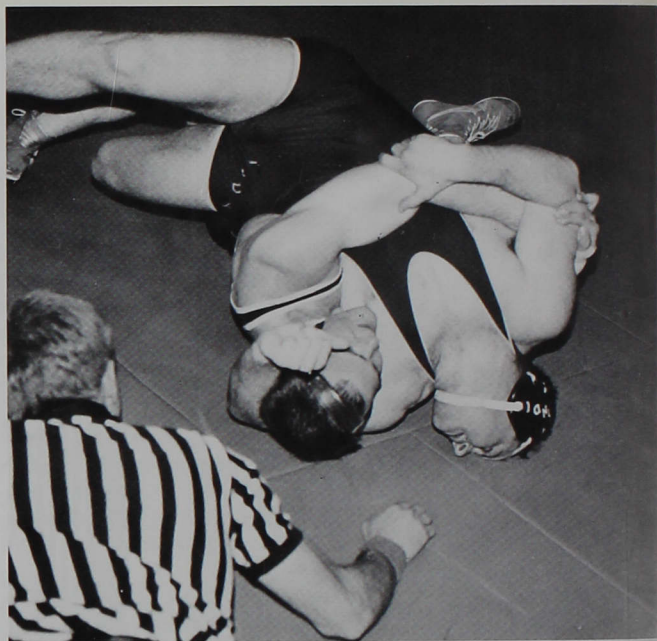

At the Greyhound Classic, the wrestlers placed first out of eight teams and claimed U of I's third consecutive Greyhound Classic title.

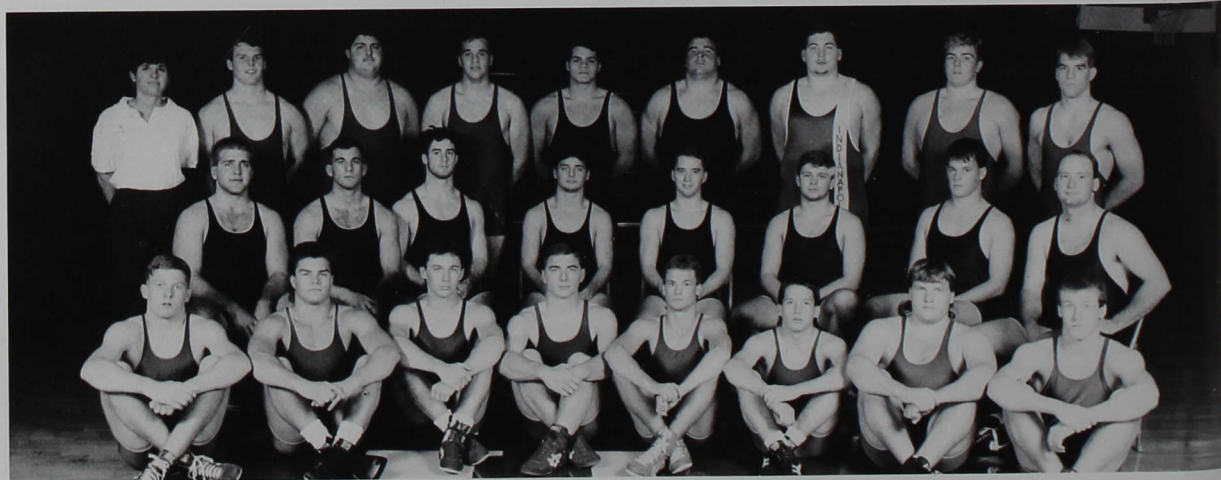
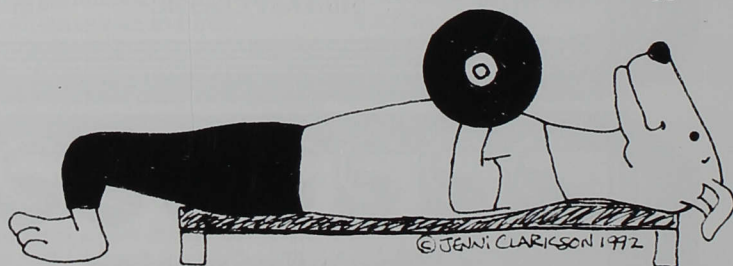
The journey came to a premature halt when a scheduling mix-up kept the wrestlers from competing in regionals.

Play Ball!

Junior pitcher/outfielder Tricia Neely earned Great Lakes Valley Conference Player of the Year honor for the second time in her three-year career, after leading the Lady Greyhound softball team to a 21-16 record and third place finish in the conference tournament. The multi-talented Neely led the GLVC in strikeouts per game (4.50); she was eighth in victories (12-7 record) and ninth in earned run average (1.86).

A highlight for Neely and Coach Sue Willey's Lady Greyhounds was doubleheader sweeps of city rivals Butler and IUPUI for Indy's first city championship since 1988. Neely hurled a no-hitter when Indy blanked Butler, 2-0, before winning the nightcap, 10-1. Against nationally-ranked IUPUI, the Lady Greyhounds won by 3-2 and 10-4 scores.

No slouch at the plate this season, Neely batted an impressive .308 with a team-high 16 RBI. A Hobart, Indiana, native, she led the team in runs scored (25) and was second on the Lady Greyhounds in hits (33) and doubles (7).

The youthful Lady Greyhounds should have even more success in the near future, as only two seniors will be lost from this talented team. Unfortunately, the two seniors were four-year starters Shannon Black and Kathy Miller. Freshman designated hitter Taunya Linton joined Neely on the All-GLVC Team after batting a team-best .378 at the plate. That effort put Linton fourth in the conference in hitting. Linton, the Kelso Reid Mental Attitude Award recipient, led Indianapolis with 34 hits on the season.

Junior Lynne Suroviak ranked among conference leaders in doubles, finishing fourth with 10 doubles in 37 games. Junior catcher Mary James, an honorable mention All-GLVC pick, served as the Lady Greyhounds' team captain. Junior first baseman Sandy Plyley led the team with a .983 fielding percentage, committing just four errors during the season. Freshman southpaw Mindy Haskett made an immediate impact on the mound during her rookie season, finishing third in the GLVC in strikeouts per game (3.93) and seventh in earned run average (1.60).

The softballers handed league champion Lewis its only defeat in the first round of the conference tournament, after splitting with Lewis during the regular season. Indy finished the conference round-robin season with a 10-6 record, earning the fourth seed in the tournament.

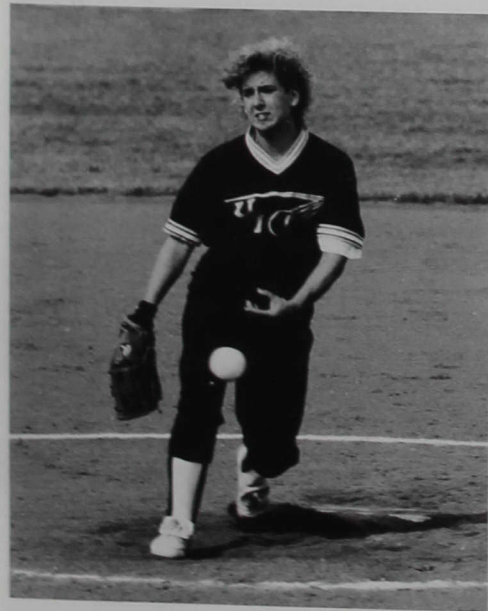

Coach Mark Peterson's baseballers experienced the rollercoaster syndrome of a youthful team, finishing an up-and-down season with an 18-24 record. A pair of sophomore transfers who were high school teammates led the Greyhounds with some impressive numbers.

Sophomore catcher Kevin Kavanaugh earned the team's Most Valuable Player award after an impressive first season. Kavanaugh batted a team-best .387 to pace the Indy attack. The big lefty also led the team in doubles with 16, equalling the school record set by Todd Hottell. The smooth swinger led the Greyhounds with 53 hits and 37 RBI in 41 games. Kavanaugh's efforts earned him first-team All-Great Lakes Valley Conference honors and second-team NCAA II Great Lakes Region accolades.

Kavanaugh also did a solid job behind the plate, guiding his former prep batterymate Jeff Montfort to some impressive numbers. The lefty flame thrower struck out 67 batters in just under 54 innings of work to rank fifth in NCAA Division II with 11.2 strikeouts per nine innings. The lanky Montfort finished the campaign with a 3-3 record and three complete games.

Junior centerfielder Scott Gilliam fought off injuries to bat .353 with 42 hits. Gilliam led Indy with 24 steals in 27 attempts to key an imposing running game. Shortstop Sean Bledsoe batted .333 in his first season as a Greyhound, leading the team with four triples. The speedy Bledsoe had a team-high 37 runs,

along with 47 hits and 23 stolen bases in 29 attempts. Third baseman Scott Miller came on strong to add to a solid junior trio. Miller batted .323 with 21 steals in 25 attempts.

On the mound, senior captain Brent Osswald led the team in victories (5), complete games (5) and innings pitched (67 2/3). Junior lefty Josh Werling and freshman Mike Powell keyed the bullpen with three saves apiece.

The Greyhound season was highlighted by doubleheader sweeps of conference rivals Ashland and Kentucky State on the road, and city rival IUPUI at home.

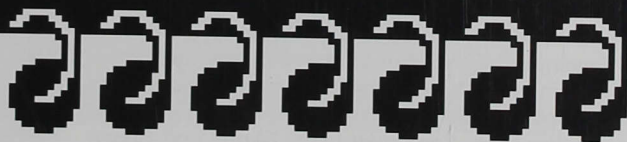

The first Greyhound men's tennis squad to win back-to-back Great Lakes Valley Conference championships, the team gave a resounding performance at the conference tournament, earning three league titles in four years! The Hounds recorded a perfect 7-0 record in conference dual matches, the first undefeated GLVC season ever for Indianapolis.

Sophomore MVP Perry Mann led the way for the record-setting Greyhounds, winning conference titles in singles and doubles to give him four in two years! Freshman Jamie Pheifer joined Mann and Hamm as singles champions with the title at #6 singles.

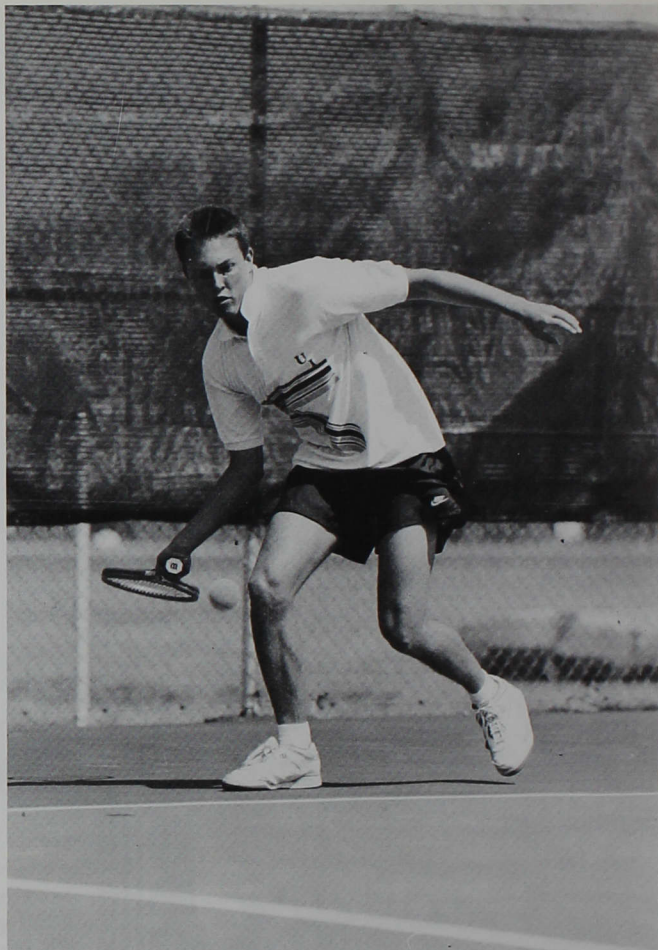
A key to the netters' league title was doubles play, with four Greyhounds earning All-GLVC honors by winning conference championships. The women's tennis team accomplished something that no other Great Lakes Valley Conference team has been able to do: win back-to-back conference championships.

Led by senior Amy Potts, the team tied St. Joseph's with 33 points to share the title. The team took four individual titles. Potts placed at #2 singles; junior Traci Griffith, at #3 singles. Number 4 singles went to sophomore Lisa Precourt, and freshman Cara Stockton won at #5 singles.

The Greyhounds also scored points with three runners-up. Potts and sophomore Kathy Redmond at #1 doubles, Griffith and Precourt at #2 doubles, and at #3 doubles, senior Chellie Gardner and junior Kristi McDaniel-Sears.

The team finished the season at 11-6. One of the losses included GLVC foe and co-champ St. Joe in the regular season. While four losses were against Division I squads.

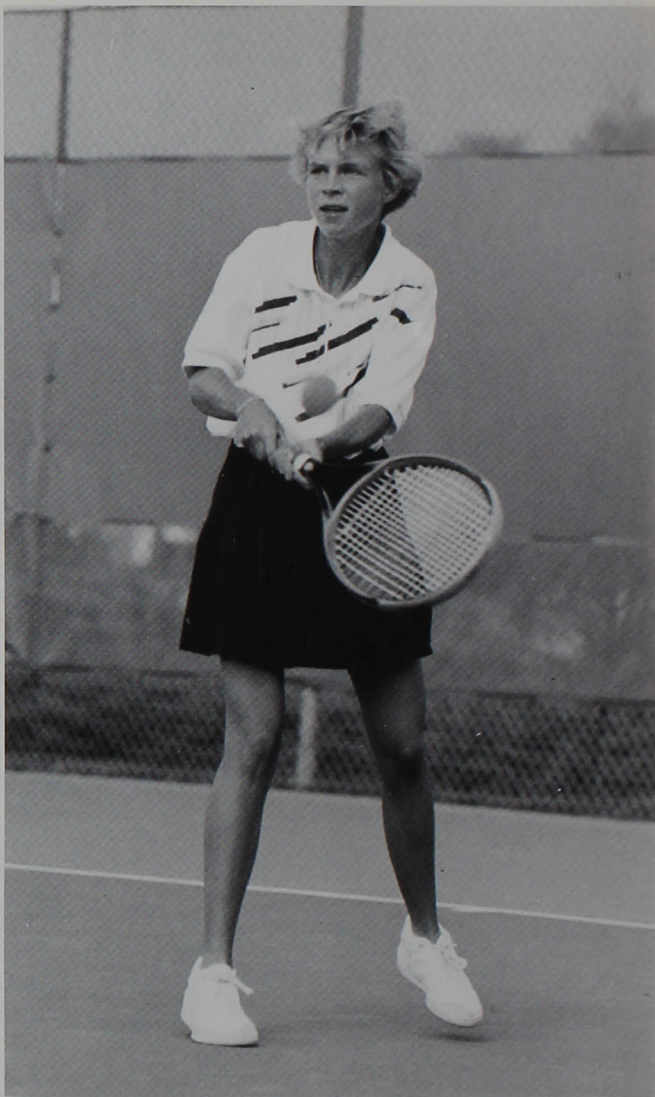
Coach of the Year honors went to Greyhound's coach Dawn Patel. "We were ready both physically and mentally," said Patel, "seeing how the players dug deep to play well during the tournament and played their best."

Potts finished out her four years with a 50-18 record in singles and 55-13 at the doubles position. She was a member of three GLVC championship teams; she was the first and only U of I player to advance to the NCAA tournament. Potts was individual champion at #1 singles for two consecutive years including an 18-0 her junior year. She was rewarded for all her hard work by receiving the Most Valuable Player Award, Mental Attitude, and Captain Awards.

Gardner, the other senior, finished her career with 48-11 at doubles. On the season, Patel said, "We set high expectations and enjoyed going after them. That's the fun part, trying to achieve them."

The team should also be recognized for placing five women on the All-Academic team. Members of the team were Redmond, Potts, Griffith, Precourt, Gardner, and McDaniel-Sears.

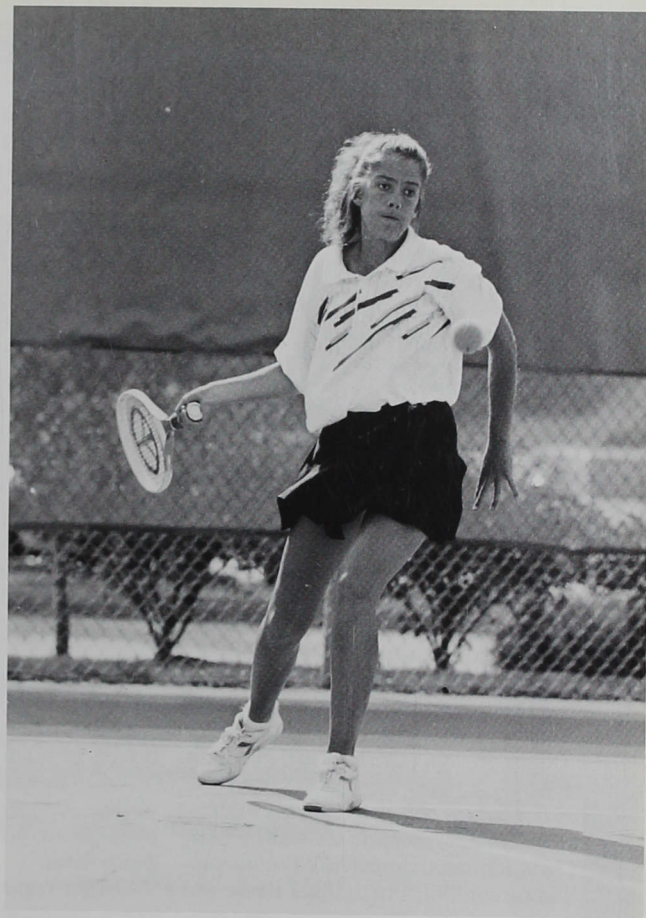

World Class!

Senior All-American Brian Burkhardt won the national championship in the hammer throw at the NCAA II Meet in San Angelo, Texas, to lead Coach Jerry England's Greyhound men's track team to a seventh-place finish in the team standings, the best in school history. Burkhardt, the top seed in the event, won with a throw of 194'0, outdistancing the runner-up by over four feet. The 1992 Greyhound team captain had finished sixth at the Nationals in the event in both 1990 and 1991 to earn All-America honors.

He becomes the sixth Indianapolis track and field athlete to win an NCAA II national championship. England has now coached six national champions and 25 NCAA II All-Americans in his impressive 20-year tenure.

Five others joined Burkhardt in earning NCAA II All-America honors. Senior Tom Noe placed fourth in the high jump, senior Brett Burkhardt, team MVP and Brian's twin brother, finished fifth in the discus, junior Matt Gaston was fifth in the hammer, freshman Jon Uecker finished seventh in the 400 meters and junior James Compton was eighth in the 110 high hurdles.

Three tracksters competed at the Nationals: senior Sam Kozyra ran in the 200 meters, junior Chris Johnson competed in the steeplechase and junior Matt Furthmiller threw the shot put.

The trackmen finished the outdoor season with an impressive 42-7 record, including the team championship at the U of I Invitational! A solid indoor season set the stage for what happened outdoors as Indianapolis successfully defended its Little State championship. Senior Tom Noe and freshman Jon Uecker

competed at the NCAA II Indoor Meet, both finishing eighth.

Junior Bill Uecker received the team's Kelso Reid Mental Attitude Award for the third consecutive season.

FAULKNER FIRST LADY OF TRACK

Junior Michelle Faulkner had an outstanding season, leading Coach Dawn Patel's Lady Greyhound tracksters to a solid 31-7 mark and a U of I Invitational championship. Faulkner earned team Most Valuable Player honors after becoming the first Indianapolis women's track competitor to qualify for the NCAA II Indoor Nationals. She won the 800 meter event at the Indiana Intercollegiates (beating every Division I university in the state) to earn a berth in the Nationals.

Faulkner, the 1991-92 Lady Greyhound Female Athlete of the Year, earned Little State Athlete of the Meet honors outdoors by winning the 800 and 1500 meter events. The two-time GLVC All-Academic selection set new school records in both events.

Senior distance runner Jenny Klehm received the team's Kelso Reid Mental Attitude Award, as well as the overall Kelso Reid award. Klehm had an impressive season, highlighted by winning the 10 K at the Little State Meet.

Senior captain Leah Ann Adams closed out a memorable career in track with her 12th varsity letter. She lettered four times in cross country, basketball and track. She also excelled in the classroom, twice earning GLVC All-Academic honors in basketball and cross country.

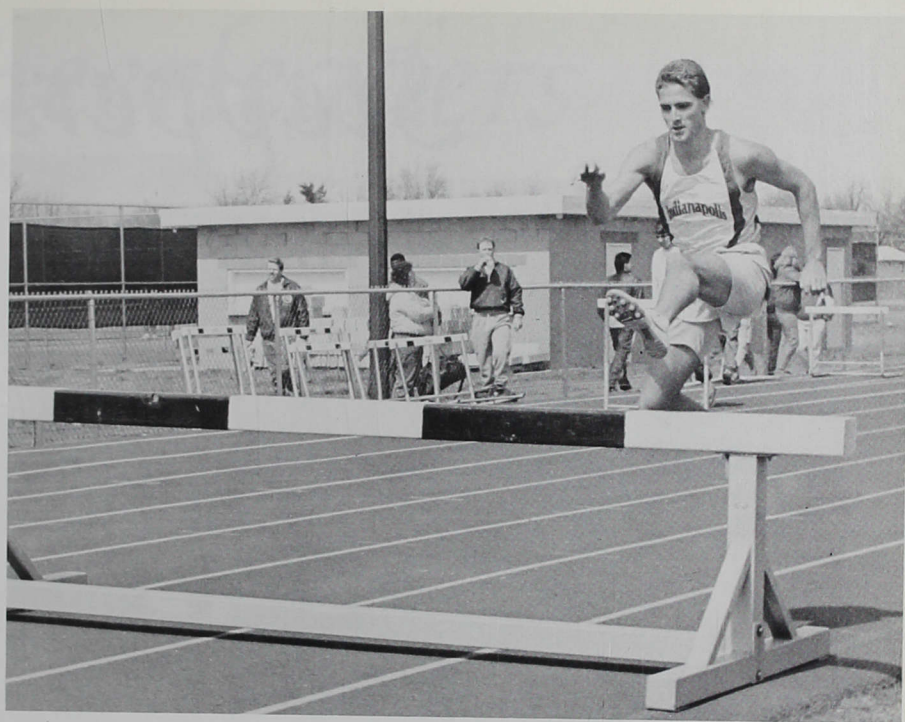

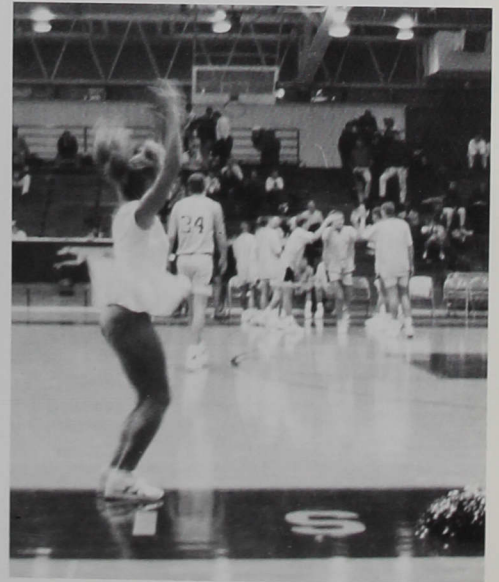

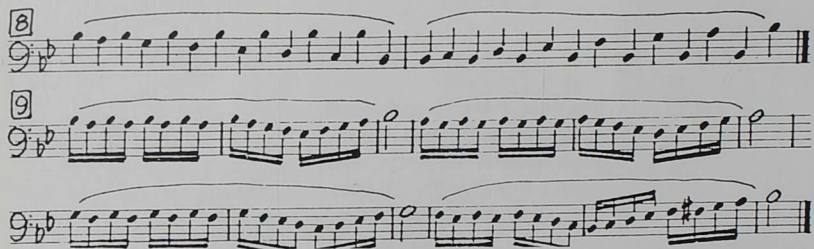

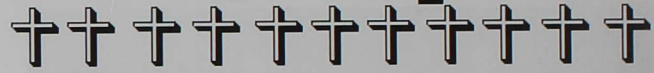

As the play ends, the Joad family finds they have no money, no jobs, and no where to go except to an old barn to stay dry and safe.

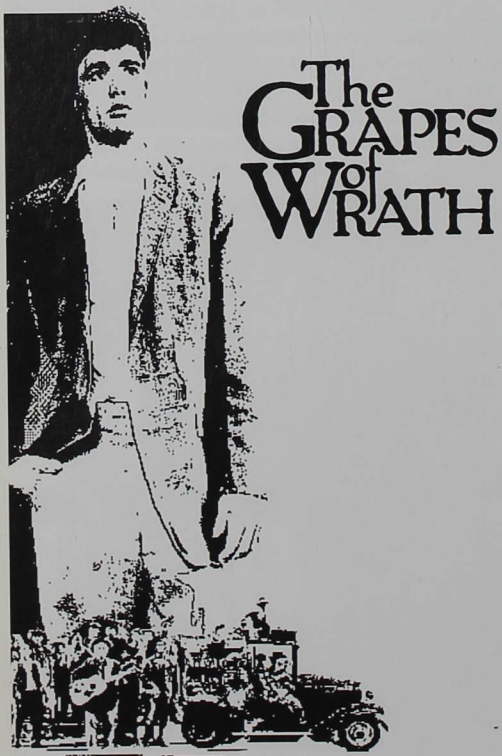

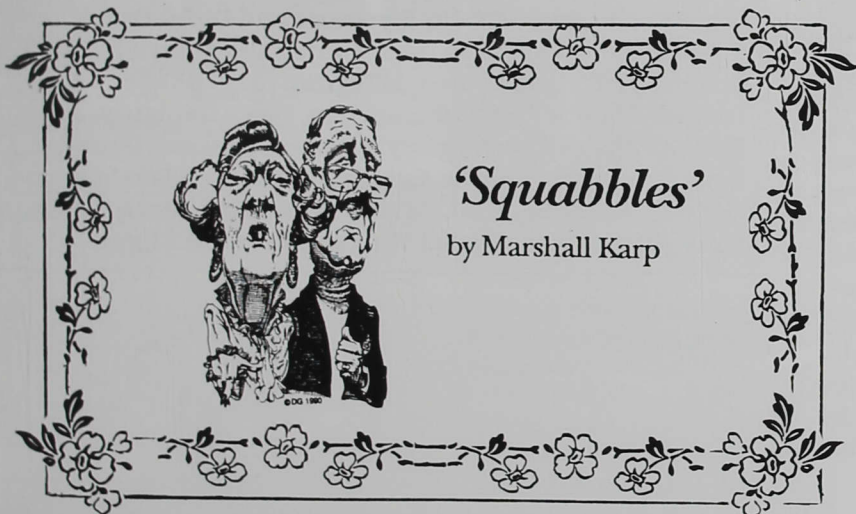

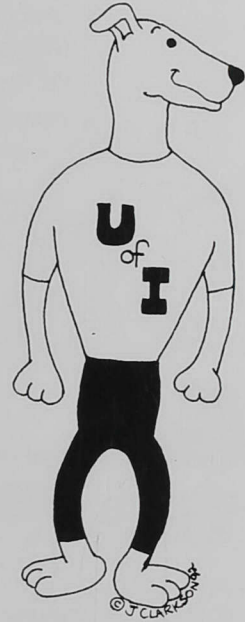

New basketball coach named

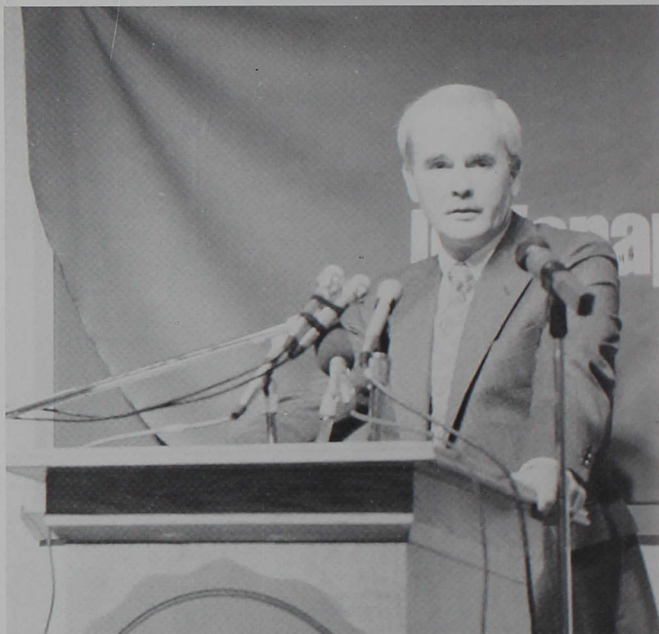

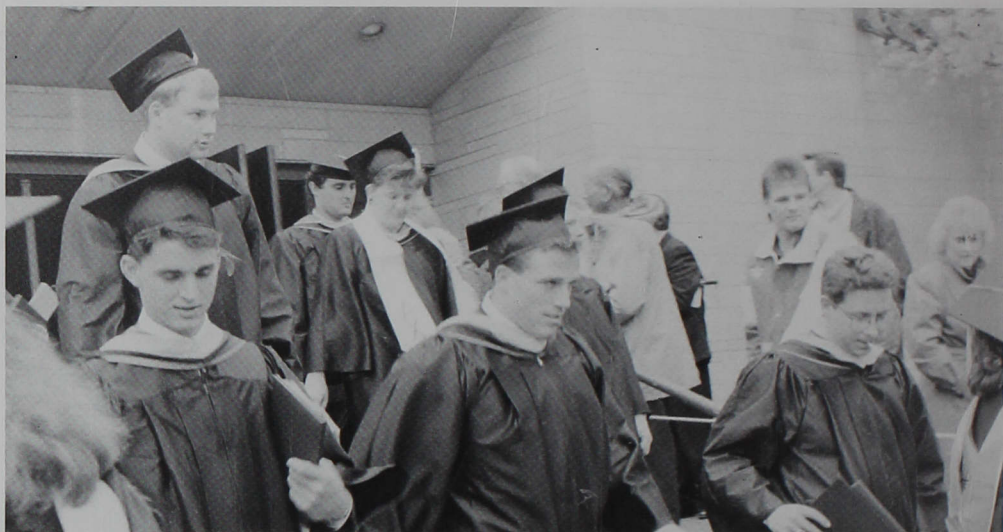

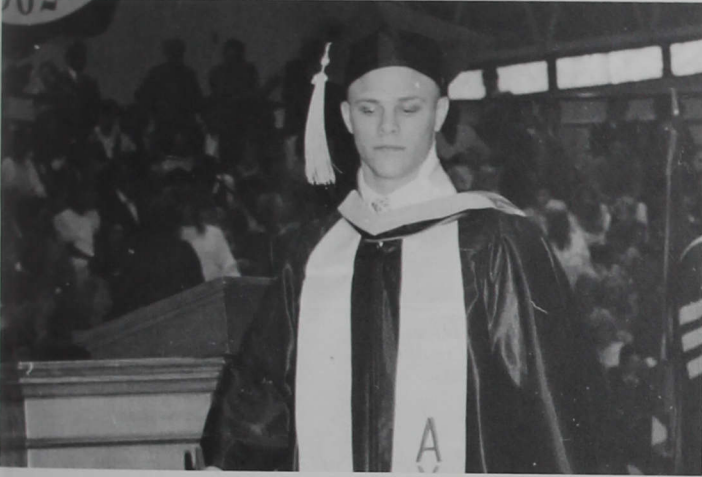

Raspberry addresses graduates

Journalist William J. Raspberry told graduating seniors "the time to worry about protecting your reputation is before you have one."

The 1958 U of I graduate, whose widely-read column on urban affairs is nationally syndicated through the *Washington Post* Writers Group, said that "building your reputation has more to do with ordinary behavior than with career planning."

Raspberry noted that such public figures as Michael Milken, Marion Barry and Bill Clinton did not anticipate the personal

damage that would result from their earlier behaviors.

Having learned how to write obituaries while a fledgling *Washington Post* reporter, Raspberry invited his audience members to fashion their own obituaries in contemplating how they want to be remembered after reaching the mid-point of their lives.

Raspberry also challenged the graduates to measure the worth of their education in terms of contributions to life rather than in dollars.

"The pursuit of money for its own sake may make you rich, but it won't make you happy," he said.

Raspberry spoke to a

packed audience in Nicoson Hall, a building not yet in existence during his own days on the then-Indiana Central campus. His sister, Hattye Raspberry Hall of Indianapolis, was in attendance, along with other members of her family. His eldest daughter, Patricia, a graduate student at the University of Michigan, surprised her father by showing up for the post-commencement dinner in Schwitzer Center.

Raspberry is also a member of the University Board of Trustees.

David R. Frick, chairman of the Board of Trustees, assisted President G. Benjamin

Lantz, Jr., in hooding three recipients of honorary degrees: local attorney and civic leader John M. Kitchen, president of John M. Kitchen Law Offices; philanthropist Dudley V. Sutphin, former president of the American Paper Stock Co. and the Beveridge Paper Co.; and Dr. John C. Kuan, statesman and social reformer with the government of The Republic of China and chairman of The Democracy Foundation (ROC).

Our job would have been a lot harder without the help of many students, administration, faculty and staff.

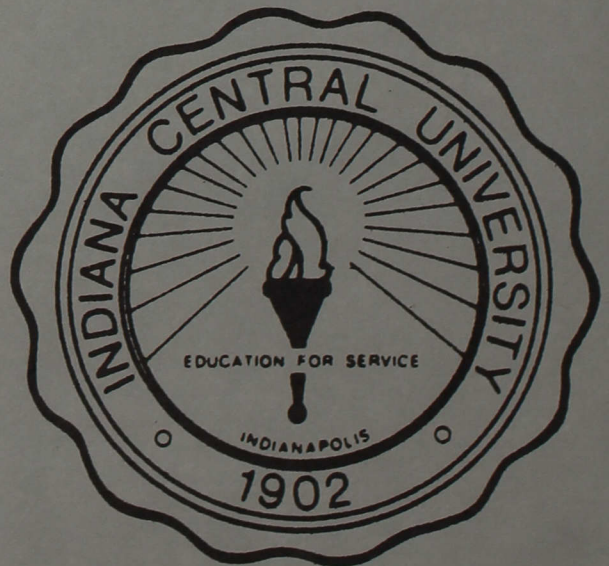
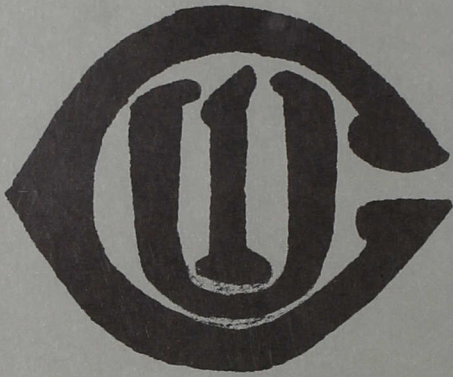
