Concentration

Each student should consult the Academic Catalog or her/his academic advisor for specific course prerequisites. Africana Studies concentration offers the opportunity to critically and scientifically study cultures histories and cultural productions of African and people of African descent. In addition, Africana studies will train students to think diverse disciplines from an Africana (Black) perspective, questioning and solving issues related to inclusion, social justice, and knowledge production. The Africana Studies concentration is open to all undergraduate students and consists of an interdisciplinary program of 12-14 credits of required and elective courses.

Choose any two (2) of the following courses from at least two different disciplines (6-8 credits)

- Choose 3 credits from the following:
 - o CSL 150 Intro to Community Service-Learning (3) OR
 - o INTD301 ST-Multicultural Competence through Leadership and Service (3) OR
 - o ST 290* ST- Service Focused Course or Travel to a country with African diasporic population (3)

NOTES:

- A grade of C- (1.7 on a 4.0 scale) or higher is required in all courses applying toward the Africana Studies concentration.
- Students must complete at least 12 hours of the above coursework beyond classes that count toward their majors.
